Phases of Change Process

Assess Status Quo

 Learn about current response and experience

Make Change

 Use info to target improvements in practice, policy, and protocol

Measure the Change

Check effectiveness/outcome



Data collection without follow-up action is meaningless

Team Data and Types of Action

- Community Needs Assessments
 - Interagency Cross Training
 - Protocol development
- Action and Implementation Plans
 - Agency-wide policy changes
 - New processes to meet need

Strategies for Change

- Interagency protocol development/revision
- Training to meet knowledge and practice gaps
- New individual practices
- Changes to agency policies
- Cross-training with team agencies
- Changing information sharing
- Increase collaboration efforts

- Team development
 - Mission, timelines, etc.
- Commit to victim-centered work
- Community awareness raising
- Create innovative programs
- Add critical partners to team
- Inter and intra agency trainings
- Develop subcommittee or taskforce
